details. The conference, I believe the largest of its kind, aims to enable young people in Europe to explore the wide range of possibilities in missions internationally today.

- See the power-point presentation prepared by the International Orality Network This network represents enthusiasts who believe that it is important to present the Gospel in ways that suit oral cultures. Their mission is: "Seeking to radically influence the way oral preference learners are evangelized and discipled in every people group."
- Tim Reeves' (AVM advisory board member) writes on consciousness. The latter, he says, cannot really be studied, as it is the great given of all givens. The mystery of the nature of consciousness should deter us from being too bold in presuming that it is the same for all peoples universally. If it is not 'the same', that implies that for education to be effective it has to be different for people who are different, i.e. that it should be in their language and reflecting their context, as advocated by the AVM!
- Aspects of Western enlightenment philosophy seem to have an iron grip on Christian mission efforts today. My realization that John Locke's notion that people are blank slates waiting to be written on is still widely held had led me to write an article on race. In this article, I point out that Western nations' struggles at countering racism are strangling development efforts in the Majority World. Pinker (not himself a professing Christian) pointed as early as 2002 to the errors in the ongoing widely-presupposed belief that people's intelligence and understanding are formed almost entirely through impacts from their

environment.³ Pinker tells us this belief is clearly WRONG, but that it has acquired the status of a secular religion. Western people, many Christians included, holding this belief extremely closely, to them justifies current trends in mission and development approaches to the Majority World. Now "ideas that seemed immoral even to question turn out to be not just questionable but probably wrong" (Pinker 2002:422).

In short – the above enlightenment position, in assuming that all people are blank slates, considers that one solution fits all, so that Western languages and education will be the panacea to everyone else in the world. The actually much more complex situation requires communication and education to be in tune with the lives of particular peoples. Vulnerable mission seems to be almost the only means in today's world for Westerners to get to a position of understanding that is sufficient to be able to begin to interact with non-Western people in the light of who they are and not only how, according to aspects of dated Western enlightenment philosophy, they ought to be.⁴
