was founded in 1881, and has Workers in

MOROCCO, ALGERIA, TUNISIA, TRIPOLI. and EGYPT.

- Its Object is to make known among the 24,500,000 Moslems in these countries the unsearchable riches of Christ; and also to reach with the Gospel some of the 2,500,000 Jews and Europeans resident therein.
- Its Character is Evangelical and Unsectarian. It gladly welcomes workers who, loving our Lord Jesus Christ in all sincerity, and being loyal to the Holy Scriptures as the inspired Word of God, are prepared for His Name's sake to go forth in dependence upon Him for the supply of every need.
- Its Practice is to rely upon the living God to meet the requirements of the workers through the free-will offerings of His people.
- Its Activities are aggressively Evangelistic. Every agency is subsidiary to the supreme object of glorifying God in gathering out a people for His name from lands which are enshrouded in the darkness of soul-destroying error.
- Its Methods include Bible Depots; Bible School for Converts; Colportage: Homes for Girls; Industrial Centres; Itineration; Medical Work; Schools; Scripture Translation; and Visitation.
- Its European Workers number sixty-five, assisted by native helpers, at eighteen centres, besides out-stations.

"LOOK ON THE FIELDS."

Where long years of faithful toil have resulted in many precious souls being brought out of the darkness of Islamic error and of Apostate Christianity into God's marvellous light.

In many parts of the field there are unparalleled openings for the preaching of the Gospel, and for the circulation of The Word. "Who, then, is willing to consecrate his service this day unto the Lord?"

Morocco—with a population of about 7,000,000. There is much material progress under European Government, but spiritual progress is sadly retarded through lack of labourers. Mission Stations are established at Casablanca, Fez, Laraish, Tangier and Tetuan.

Algeria—where civilization is advancing but where Christ is little known. The call is insistent for reinforcements to reach with the message of God's grace more of its 5,600,000 inhabitants. Work is maintained at Algiers, Boghni, Bone, Cherchell, Djemaa Sahridj and Tebessa.

Tunisia—with its thrilling records of heroic testimony for Christ, including Raymond Lull's splendid crusade of love. The cry sounds forth: "Who follows in their train?" Efforts to reach some of these 1,800,000 souls are being made in and around Bizerta, Kairouan, Sfax and Tunis.

Tripoli—the land of desert wastes and about 1,300,000 needy souls. From thence came Simon. "On him they laid the cross that he might bear it after Jesus." Who to-day is gladly willing to spend and be spent out in love for those for whom Christ tasted death? Tripoli City alone is occupied, owing to lack of labourers.

Egypt—with its fascinating history, where Moses made his great renunciation for God. To-day the Master's ground of appeal is "For My sake and the Gospel's." Who, then, will yield life and service to Him in the Nile Delta, where thousands of centres have no Missionary? Work is carried on in Alexandria, Shebin-el-Kom, and out-stations.

A secretary can render invaluable service by enlisting the sympathy of the Lord's people, by distributing literature, by arranging prayer circles or public meetings; and generally by stirring up heart concern on behalf of the work in the lands along the Mediterranean Littoral.
- By Remembering the Words of the Lord Jesus, how He said:—"It is more blessed to give than to receive."
