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more spiritual lines; the membership is individual, not denominational, and all members are pledged to pray daily for unity.

The Churches of Latin America are clearly showing a desire to sink minor points of difference, and present a common front to the forces of materialism, agnosticism, and ecclesiasticism with which they have to contend; they are realizing the need of a united testimony to the salvation of soul and life that there is in Jesus Christ. It is of primary importance that this desire should be fostered by the missionary societies. Unfortunately there is a danger that these latter, thinking still in terms of denominational integrity and achievement, may unconsciously hinder the spiritual unity and co-operation at which the Churches are aiming. Closer co-operation amongst the missionary organizations is needed, so that they may take the lead in helping the Churches to a realization and adequate expression of the unity which alone will allow the fullest freedom to the Spirit of God in nation-wide witness.

This summary of recent events has no pretence at exhaustiveness, but it serves to illustrate the need there is for the missionary enthusiast to 'change with the times' and to watch continually to see how God is fulfilling His purposes. Each phase of world development brings its moment of opportunity, and only he who watches can seize it for the extension of the Gospel of Christ.

Travelling in Guatemala

Few, except those who have so travelled, have any concrete idea of what is involved in these journeys. The unhappy animals (mules) sink up to their bellies in the foul mud, while the muleteers work half-naked, shouting, cursing and torturing the beasts into a fresh effort. Up the mountains the trail climbs in an interminable zig-zag, the path resembling a giant staircase, each step a pool of mud—worn by successive generations of animals. The rivers have to be swum or forded. At night one is glad to arrive at any humble hovel, and sling a hammock among the pigs or throw oneself down on a heap of coffee beans. A few fleas do not matter if one is tired; and the animals must be rounded up at 4 a.m. if a start is to be made with the light. Over such trails as these the Gospel has been carried into thousands of humble homes throughout the continent.—(Extract from a letter from Mr. Kenneth G.
