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## WORLD DOMINION

My programme touches weekly many hundreds of women, and my normal working hours are all day long. I have had this year various meetings, gatherings for the deepening of spiritual life, as well as meetings for non-Christian women. I have testified for my Saviour at funerals, weddings, birthday parties, and in little meetings in courtyards, going from gate to gate. I have introduced the Gospel while sitting cross-legged on the family beds of Chinese homes, in little rooms of new brides, and in the ceremonial halls of many a 'Grand Old Lady,' on corners of streets, in Gospel halls, and churches, and wherever the opportunity has offered. I have seldom met with opposition. Living faith in the multiplicity of the Chinese idols I have rarely found, but interest in my message I have encountered everywhere. The spiritual hunger I have daily met with has been both appalling and inspiring. If there ever was a glorious opportunity in China for spiritual mission work, it is now. This is the time for open, frank, direct evangelism. The Chinese themselves are asking for it. It is the one and great need of to-day.

## A Typical North China Village Home

'It was only a little three-roomed hut, and typical of millions. The room in the middle served as kitchen and pantry combined, as well as the family shrine. In front of the door, in a carved wooden frame, were the pictures of deities, with an incense-stand in front and a gong at the side. The gong is sounded to invite the deity to possess the chosen image, and the worshipper bumps his head on the ground, burns incense and makes vows.

'A separate little picture was of the god who cures eye-diseases ... its aid had been often sought. In a corner near the door, on the wall, was a picture of the dread little kitchen god, who reports on all domestic concerns and is offered sticky concoctions. . . The idea is that his jaw will stick and family failings be hid.

'Then and there the "eye-curer" had a lighted match applied to him by his owner . . . that in future the family might try the hospital instead.'—The Beloved Physician.
