## International Fellowship for World-Wide Witness

FOUNDATION.—Three common loyalties:—(1) To the Lord Jesus Christ and the centrality of His Cross. (2) To the Bible as the final authority in faith and practice. (3) To the Lord's command to witness to every creature.

*Recommendation.*—(I) To study the Bible. To spend an adequate time in prayer. To seek daily a deeper experience of God's love and power, and, by witness, to win others to Christ so as to contribute towards the objective of a million members of the Fellowship. To seek with others to witness to everyone in a village or town or city or county or other geographical area at frequent intervals.

*Co-ordination* is absolutely essential if World Evangelization is to be accomplished. There should not be any pressure brought to bear upon those who are, or wish to be, in fellowship, to interfere with their existing work or obligations. There should be freedom to adopt any methods which seem to individuals or groups to be the best for reaching the objective. The Fellowship is a free association of individuals and movements co-ordinated for world-wide witness.

This Movement aims at reaching every unevangelized field with the Gospel and at taking the key positions which world survey reveals and which will influence whole countries. Therefore, those associated with it are asked to keep in regular touch with the Intelligence Department at the Mildmay Conference Centre, London, N.I., from which literature can be obtained. A unique feature of the Fellowship is that income from it is designed to fill the gap which exists between the work which is at present being done, and that which ought to be done to complete world evangelization in our generation, and it is estimated that this could be accomplished if a million members could each give or gather an average of a penny a day. Some may not be able to give as much as this; some may be able to give more; some may not be able to give at all. Money is not a condition of membership. We have no doubt, however, but that enthusiasm for the evangelization of the world would enable us to reach the ideal herein set up.

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
