the future. It will not be made until, in some form, the Orthodox Church within the Soviet boundaries can also enter the arena. Then the old battle cry, 'Here East, there West' will sound anew, but then the Evangelical Church, too, will have appeared on the field.

Meanwhile, this Evangelical Church has actually come into existence.* She has not asserted herself actively in the struggles between the Eastern and Western Churches, but when she has been consulted by Orthodox and Uniat alike, she has placed herself at their disposal and is now helping the Eastern Slavs to realize what history has until now denied them—the Reformation.

The age-long struggle between East and West, which, since the fall of the Czarist Church and the rise of Poland, has reached a wider and more intense stage, has acquired a new and peculiar significance. The decision, however, no longer rests between Rome, Moscow and Constantinople alone, but Geneva and Wittenberg have also to be reckoned with.

Will Geneva and Wittenberg recognize their responsibility? And will they seek to discharge it?

Force and Fraud

Machiavelli was the first avowed exponent of the dogma that force and fraud are proper instruments of statecraft. The poison of Machiavellism did much to precipitate the Great War and to give it its character of peculiar barbarity.

Machiavelli himself, having applied his principles in the conduct of his own career, died in exile and dishonour, distrusted and hated by all. Similarly, Caesar Borgia, the man inimitable in craft and merciless in cruelty, whom Machiavelli exalts as the model Italian potentate, was ultimately hounded out of Italy and driven to perish in the Pyrenees.

In spite, however, of the plainest lessons of history, sections of the human race are determined to put Machiavellism to the test of practice again, and by repudiating good faith and by piling up instruments of terror attain to world dominion.

Nothing can be more certain than that if they seek dominion by the methods of force and fraud they will be, in the end, destroyed.—
