government, and only a few foreigners have been permitted to gain access, but one of the chief reasons is that the Christian Church has never really faced the problem of the Islamic world. It is a hard problem, it is difficult, it requires great patience, and the results forthcoming are few. The attitude of the Church towards Islam might be likened very much to that of the small boy who leaves the hardest part of a task until the last.

Knowledge of the need is sufficient challenge. Now that the needs of this great province of Arabia are known, there is no longer the excuse of ignorance. It will be a difficult task, of course, but difficulty is the very essence of challenge. Does not the fact that it was only in 1935 that the first missionary tour into this part of Arabia was made bring to the lips the cry: 'How long, oh Lord! how long?' Here is a country that once knew Christian influence, but where now there is not a single living Christian. The Master's words clearly ring down through the ages: 'Go ye into all the world!' and Hadramaut is a part of this world. As in other parts of Arabia the doors are not wide open, but they stand slightly ajar. They can only be opened through prayer and by men and women of really pioneer stuff who use Christian tact and common sense in their approach. The only type of missionary work possible at the moment, and the method that will have to be adopted for a long time, is patient, itinerating medical missionary work, done in close, sincere co-operation with the political authorities, both local and foreign.
