when one's whole soul is going out in the desire that they shall hear about Christ and salvation. What happens? It happens again and again. The Holy Spirit gives one a definite reply to the question asked. 'I was born with a white skin. No alcoholic spirit or bleaching substance made me white, but there was one part of me that was black—black with sin, and I allowed Jesus to come and wash that part of me, and nothing but His blood would take the stain away.'

His command is to ' preach the Gospel to every creature,' but until every house is entered and the doors of every room of those houses thrown open, the girls and women of India will not hear, for behind closed doors sit hundreds of India's women.

I know of no work that appeals to one's heart as this, for who but Christ can free these women from the shackles of fear and superstition, the dread of evil spirits and the evil eye? Who can bring healing to the crushed and broken body, but He who was broken for them ?

'The burden of the valley of vision '—a valley with open doors and so few to enter; that is the burden, that is it which sent Henry Martyn, William Carey and others first to their knees, then out into the valley. To-day the challenge comes to us in such words as 'World Wide Witness,' 'Evangelize to a Finish.' The eyes of many are on the unevangelized places of the earth, and the burden of them is pressing some down on their knees. As in the days of Henry Martyn, from the province of Bihar and from the district of the Open Doors, the Tharuhat and the Nepal Border, comes the plaintive cry:

> The door is open, come over and help us, God of Stars and Sun, dear God, send light.
