report in which it proposes that instead of pressing for organic union from the beginning, church union should be realized on a federated basis of organization, giving the existing communions considerable autonomy for the present; that a central headquarters be set up, whose work it shall be to correlate the various denominations, unify their programmes and gradually work towards complete union; that all new evangelistic efforts, both within and outside of Japan, be co-operative in character and planned and carried forward under the auspices of this central headquarters; that arrangements be made to facilitate the passing of members from one denomination to another in order to stop the tragic leakage and loss to the Christian Church caused by the large number of unnourished and unrelated absentee church members. The annual meeting of the National Christian Council took no action regarding these proposals but left the commission free to prosecute its work along these lines.

## Morocco in Mufti\*

Morocco in Mufti, by James Haldane, will hold a place of its own among the many books which have been written about Morocco. In part it covers ground traversed by former writers. It sketches the present transition of the country from medievalism to modernity, makes us hear the violent clash of a new world as it impinges upon a hoary Moslem civilization and disturbs a Berber way of life as old as Moses. It gives us a passing glimpse of old Moorish gateways. beautiful mosques and colleges, wherein carved marble and onyx, cool colonnades and intricate arabesques make an unforgettable

These things, however, lie on the margins of the book. Its central theme is one which few writers on Morocco have tackledthe Moor himself. Not the Moor as known to the European, but the Moor as he is known to the Moor and to the writer. This is indeed a study of surpassing interest. Fantastic and whimsical are some of the discoveries made by the author touching the mental and spiritual processes of the Moor in his relation to God and to the world about him. A quarter of a century's study of the people and their language, together with a flair for this kind of investigation, were preparations for this first volume. We should not be surprised

if there is a call for another.
