is not, in general, the one called to enter new fields of evangelization. Among our peoples there exist a large number of prejudices and obstacles against the public and direct activity of the *gringo*, which do not exist when a national citizen breaks the ice with the message. Once the national has secured interest in, or acceptance of, the message by some, the interested groups are the first to request a visit from the foreigner so that they may receive more instruction. If he follows the national worker, the foreign missionary, who has learned how to sympathize with the national spirit, will find a large field for the exercise of his zeal and activity, and will receive a warm welcome.

Ecuador, the neglected western republic of South America, urgently needs the interest and prayer of the Church of Christ, and, through its own authorities, solicits immediate help. Rarely can the words of Christ be applied with such accuracy as to this situation: 'The harvest indeed is white, but the labourers are few. Pray the Lord of the harvest that He may send forth labourers.'

## A Definite Objective

DURING a recent holiday in Germany, which included a stay in Berlin, I visited the headquarters of the Hitler Youth Movement where I saw many things of great interest. Though opinions must differ, both as to value of objective and method of action, and though exception might be taken to various details in the outworking of the organization, yet with these things I am not, for the moment, specially concerned. Everything interested me, and a great deal impressed me deeply. I listened with attention while an enthusiastic young leader expounded the principles of Nazi reform, but when he had finished then I spoke, and he, in turn, gave me his undivided attention as I told of Christ and His service. When I had finished he said, 'Where we differ from the Christian Church is that we have a definite objective. We know what we want and we know that we shall get it because we are united on the subject. The churches are divided and have no common aim. I go there (nodding his head toward one church steeple), I shall probably be warned against what I shall hear at that other place (indicating a distant belfry). Without a common object, and without unity of method, the Church can do nothing for us.'

When we had parted I was meditating on the words of my Master: 'May they all be one... that the world may know.' 'May they all be one... that the world may believe.'
