to have what I would describe as three conversions. There is first the conversion which brings him out to India, and the more definite and distinct an experience it has been the better will he be able to lead others to Christ. There is, however, a second conversion, and that is the ability to see everything from the inside, to feel and understand the pulse of the new society he has entered, to see his task from the indigenous viewpoint. This is in reality a real conversion, and there are those who have passed through it, and those who have not. It makes every problem and question appear quite different from what it would normally be.

There is also a third conversion, one peculiarly needed by the agent of the efficient and aggressive West, and that is a conversion to the spirit of the lowly Jesus in all our dealings with our Indian brethren. If there is a second mile to go, the missionary must traverse it; if it is necessary to forgive a brother seventy times seven, it is the missionary who must be prepared to make the last act of forgiveness. 'Learn of Me for I am meek and lowly in heart.' This is the only spirit which will win India, and it is vital for every missionary to put on this garment of lowliness in all sincerity. Shall we confess that we Westerners have signally failed here, and that this is the step most needed in order to establish the fellowship with Christ in India against which nothing can prevail?

Call to an International Night of Prayer

In twenty different parts of the country an all night of prayer has been held in conjunction with Mildmay Campaigns. Sometimes at these meetings as many as 300 people have been present. Mildmay is now issuing invitations, which it is estimated will reach at least 50,000 people throughout the world, to spend the last night of this year in prayer. 'As the New Year is born,' says the invitation, "let us girdle the world with prayer. Prayer is the greatest known force in the world, greater than any force or power discovered by Science, and this power God has given to His Church.'
