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plan. In this way it has also been possible to have a number of specialists, for instance, in the departments of literature and women's work.

The Central African people in their natural surroundings are deeply religious, but contact with an industrial civilization confronts them with a new and wonderful material world. So the present trend is in the direction of a rapid material development, with a corresponding atrophy of spiritual life. The third and most important result of missionary activity in the Copperbelt is the development of Christian character in many of the Africans. If divorced from religion, material development is only a distortion of personality; in the light of the Christian Gospel, all these things fall into their true perspective.

The Copperbelt is by no means the only place in the world to-day where secular forces are at work, but it is one of the focus points where they are battling with Christianity. But nowhere has God left himself without witnesses, He is still working miracles through the lives of dedicated men and women of many tribes and nations. My experience in the Copperbelt has doubled my conviction that while secularism and nationalism can change the face of the earth, yet the one and only force which can save man and give him the fulness of life God meant him to have, is the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Africa's Riches

Most of the riches of South Africa are due to the gold deposits, but the gold of the Transvaal could not be exploited except by Native labour. At the present time about 400,000 Natives are labouring in the mines, and, provided that the price of gold does not fall, and the projected development of the Rand takes place, there may be needed between now and 1940, 450,000 to 500,000 Native labourers. From the point of view of morals and religion there is a complete break up of tribal life and tradition. A hopeful event is the creation of the Christian Council of South Africa which seeks to concentrate the Christian conscience of the Churches upon the Native and his problems.—Revue Missionaire.
