man's civilization at the mines. Every year as the men come back the voice of the sceptic and the critic is heard round the village-fires and the witness of Christianity as a way of life is blurred and dimmed.

The white missionary is to-day no longer, evangelistically speaking, of first-class importance. He is in the rear of the battle, the 'front' is in the mines from Belgian Congo to the Cape. Even at the rear the strategically important person is not the missionary but the African pastor and teacher. Yet, with all that, there is a real job for the missionary, that of friend, adviser, inspirer and strengthener to his African Christian colleagues, especially the pastors and teachers. They need help desperately to understand what is going on in the life of their generation and to see a vision of the indwelling Christ, ruling, changing, making glad the whole of life. They need to see the eternal value of the things of the spirit. If the African is to be saved from giving his soul to the love of the material, and the danger is very real and great, he must be brought face to face with God in His demand for holiness, and God in His offer of indwelling power and peace. The quality, and the success, of the African preachers, teachers and witnesses depend greatly on the work, the understanding and the life of their missionary colleagues.

Humanly speaking, the African Church seems too uncertain in faith, too bewildered, too ignorant, to meet the need of this generation. And that need is urgent. But throughout the history of the Church it has always been at times like these that revival has come and the impossible has been achieved. When the odds are greatest is the day of His power.
