## Battle for Brotherhood in India To-day

In the last number of WORLD DOMINION, Dr. McGavran, in the final article in his series on 'The Battle for Brotherhood in India To-day,' referred (on page 261) to a conference which Mr. Gandhi had with Christian leaders, and attributed certain remarks to Mr. Gandhi. have now received a letter from Dr. McGavran, telling us that Bishop Azariah declares that the alleged statement was not made by Mr. Gandhi. Dr. McGavran says that he 'heard the story from a dozen different sources, did not hear that it was confidential, and incorporated the incident' in his article 'in all good faith'. He adds: 'I am happy promptly to tender complete apologies to Mr. Gandhi and Bishop Azariah.'

It is necessary to draw attention to this apology because quotations

from Dr. McGavran's article have appeared in the Indian press.

We append a letter written by the Bishop of Dornakal to the Editor of The Guardian:

August, 4th, 1938.

SIR,

I have read your editorial paragraph on the interview I had with Gandhiji. I exceedingly regret that any reference at all should have been made to that interview; and in the interests of truth please allow me a little space for this reply.

1. The interview referred to was in the month of March 1937, and it

is not therefore accurate to say in July 1938 that it was held 'recently.'
2. The so-called 'conference' was held between Gandhiji, Bishop Pickett and myself, with four other friends present who were allowed to be silent members at the interview. Dr. McGavran, the writer of the article from which you have quoted, was not one of these.

3. Gandhiji and I agreed at the very outset that neither he nor we will publish anything that took place in this interview. Both sides

have honourably kept the promise.

4. Every statement-without exception-attributed to Gandhiji by Dr. McGavran is wholly and absolutely untrue. Whether Gandhiji made any such statement or statements, anywhere else or to anybody else, at any other time, I do not know. But simply, he did not say or suggest, directly or indirectly, anything like what is attributed to him in this article. The whole, as far as our interview in March 1937 is concerned, is a cruel fabrication. And that is the only interview I have had with him in twenty years!

I am exceedingly sorry for this. I have already asked Dr. McGavran

for an explanation.
