In view, however, of the unfinished task amongst the Malagasy, the Conference had reluctantly to decide that no special workers could be detailed for this work. Yet something is to be attempted by the dissemination of evangelistic literature in their respective languages, to be distributed by voluntary workers. The French Mission, meanwhile, was asked to explore the possibilities of approach to the people of the Comoros, and to appeal to the Government for facilities for work amongst the prisoners in the coastal convict settlements of St. Marie and Nossibe. In the central Christian areas the Churches are to be encouraged to use 'Wayside pulpits' and also to find means for disseminating more Christian literature.

After a hard week of two sessions a day the Conference closed with the central act of faith and loyalty to its Lord. The delegates of all the representative missions—varied in nationality and divided in Church orders—met in the Norwegian church and together partook of the sacred emblems of unity in Christ, the one Lord and Head of the Church. The service throughout was conducted in the Malagasy language. On their dispersal the delegates carried back to their task a renewed sense of vocation and a deeper urge to work for the completion of the task of winning Madagascar for Christ.
