The Cambridge Conference revealed this for not only did its blessing lie in the word preached, but also in the work performed by the delegates who were present.

Who can measure the power of the fellowship in the Colleges between these thirty-three nations, the family prayers, the willing service of the Cambridge men and women undergraduate guides, the results that will come from the speakers being together for a week in the Garden House Hotel, and the influences of the buildings of Cambridge, with their significant names, telling of the great cloud of witnesses of past days? The focal point of it all was found in the Conference hymn, the tune of which was heard in many a 'bus as the delegates left; 'We rest on Thee and in Thy name we go',—Whose Name? Christ's—Who is our Freedom.

## Sunday School by Post

A correspondent, writing about the Postal Sunday School Movement, tells us that thousands of Bibles and New Testaments have been posted during the last few years to children of the settlers in the vast spaces of Australia. Many of these hardy toilers never see a minister of the Gospel. To numbers of them the Bible is an unknown Book, and the way of salvation

has never been pointed out.

To these isolated settlers the advent of the postman is always fraught with excitement. Packages that have been arriving lately at the quaint little mail-boxes are received with great joy. These are sent off by the Postal Sunday School Movement, and contain attractive books and papers, including a magazine entitled Joy Bells, and an invitation to join the Postal Sunday School Movement, which has its headquarters in Sydney. As a result, applications are coming in week by week. One little girl wrote: 'We are in such a hurry to join that I am writing bad,' and a boy says: 'How did you know that I lived here? This is such a quiet place.'

Over eleven thousand scholars are now enrolled, and they send splendid answers to questions given on Bible stories. Joy Bells is welcomed in over six thousand homes. It is read by whole families and then passed on to friends. It has been described as a 'fingerpost to point the reader to the

Bible and to Christ.'

This interesting Movement has a strong branch of the Scripture Union and co-operates with the Children's Special Service Mission in the holding of seaside camps. Its postal ministry has resulted in the conversion of parents, teachers and children.
